## Canada

Since moving to Brunei in 1997, my work as a painter has been directly affected by the intense, ever-growing environment that surrounds me. The rather barren $C$ anadian landscape that had shaped my perception of what an environment was, and my immersion in the lush, fetid oven of life that is the landscape of Borneo caused intense sensory confusion. At midday while walking in the jungle I could hear the plants growing with a high-pitched, electrical buzz, and see the heat melting into the leaves and the earth.
The environment here seems to grow incessantly with a kind of hunger fuelled by the intensity of the sun. | had dreams of being absorbed by strange plants with huge pores and cells that would dissolve my skin while | slept. These dreams were intensified with stories of brutal hand-to-hand killings that were taking place in Kalimantan. The passion of the blood lust unleashed by the massacres seemed somehow suited to this environment of perpetual, furious growth in which creeper vines overtake and kill other plants in a mad desire to grow, to be alive. The |ban warriors mark their skin with plant-like motifs in a strange ritual of camouflage. They paint themselves into the growth; they join in this strange dance of decay and growth, of death and life. If my paintings required a theme, I would describe the theme as the inevitability of life. In the forests of Borneo it is life that seems eternal and inescapable.

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
